Update on the COVID-19 cluster investigation and current situation

As of May 5, Anguilla has recorded a total of 95 confirmed cases with 35 recoveries. Since the previous update, 6 recoveries have been recorded, which includes 2 imported cases (visitors) which were detected on April 19 and 29 and 4 cases from the cluster. Thus there are 60 active cases associated with the current cluster. In total there were 65 cases of COVID-19 all associated with the cluster first identified on April 21. 64 cases were detected locally and 1 case was detected in the UK, which was an Anguillian resident who left Anguilla on April 19 and was confirmed positive for COVID-19 on April 21.

Cluster Cases Overview

The following summary pertains to the 64 cases detected locally:

The cases identified consist of 57 adults and 7 children ranging in age from 7 months to 77 years. They are 23 females and 41 males who are isolated in either home or government quarantine. Three males ages 42, 56 and 43 were hospitalized for varying degrees of respiratory distress. The last report shared on May 5, indicates that they had all improved and were all more stable. The majority of cases are in persons aged 30 - 59 years old - 41 cases (64%); under 30 years - 14 cases (22%) and 60+ years - 9 cases (14%).

Thus far, a total of 15 persons have reported a diagnoses of underlying medical conditions that are risk factors for severe disease and death if infected by COVID-19:

- 11 with hypertension (including two of the hospitalized gentlemen)
- 1 with genetic thromboembolic disease
- 1 with diabetes
- 2 with hypertension and diabetes

The cases within the cluster all share a common exposure which is linked to a place, person and/or setting in time. There is a wide distribution of cases across various villages in Anguilla, with the largest number of cases in South Hill.

Testing and Contact Tracing

Upon identification of the cluster, the Ministry of Health undertook an aggressive contact tracing effort which has led to COVID-19 testing of more than 1460 persons since April 22. Thus far, no additional cases have been recorded since April 29.

However, contact tracing is ongoing and will end when no more additional positives are confirmed from the cluster. The majority of cases and their quarantined contacts from the cluster are due for Day 14 testing on May 6 - 7.

Vaccination Deployment Update

As of May 5, there were 8007 registered persons of which 7332 persons had received their first dose, representing 58% of the target population figure of 12,600 persons. Thus far, 3173 persons have received their second dose. The breakdown by occupation of first doses is as follows:

- 306 Healthcare workers
- 437 Civil, border protection and port staff
- 1388 Hospitality
- 931 Retired
- 4284 Others

Using 2011 census age demographics, the breakdown of individuals who have received the vaccine by age, is as follows:

- 1994 persons age 18 34 (50% of target)
- 2198 persons age 35 49 (55% of target)
- 2040 persons age 50 64 (85 % of target)
- 1103 persons age 65+ (92% of target)

Since April 21, there has been a significant rise in the number of first doses administered, especially in younger age groups. Compliance in presenting for second doses is largely good and next week the Health team will start to follow up with persons that have missed a second dose.

Police update on enforcement and policing plan

The Commissioner of Police updated Council on the enforcement operations of the RAPF.

In terms of inland security persons seem to be compliant. The search and rescue boat is in use and the customs boat should be operating by tomorrow. Work is ongoing to ensure that the search operations can be extended from 16 hours to 18 hours a day. 9 more Special Constables are required for enforcement operations. Potentially illegal movement at sea to the South of Anguilla, has been identified and the RAPF is working with the authorities in St Martin/St. Maarten to further enhance border surveillance. A meeting with

the departments of Immigration and Customs will take place to chart the way forward for continued enforcement.

COVID-19 De-escalation of Measures

The Ministry of Health continues to stress the importance of the gradual relaxation of containment measures to limit the further spread of COVID-19. The Ministry supports the extension of the relevant legislation with the following recommendations towards a guided and safe re-opening of sectors, as per the table attached.

Council:

- 1) thanked the Health team for their continued hard work;
- noted that Government departments will be sanitized and the arrangements are in hand;
- 3) noted that the Treasury and Inland Revenue departments have been operating;
- 4) noted that during the period May 7 to May 13 educators will be accommodated so that they may access any materials which may have been left at school premises;
- noted that during the period May 7 to May 13 it is still necessary to restrict movements and accordingly only food delivery services are permitted;
- 6) noted that in Step 1 of the de-escalation measures, a group of up to 12 fully vaccinated persons may mix indoors (not including restaurants or bars) and that this measure is somewhat challenging to monitor. However, vaccinated persons have to be incentivized and this is the approach being used in the United Kingdom and USA. By this time it should also be ascertained that the risk of undetected cases is low;

- 7) noted that from May 21, with appropriate protocols in place, students in 4th, 5th and 6th form need to be accommodated so that class based assessments may be completed;
- 8) noted that consideration will be given to accommodating residents that wish to return to Anguilla before May 21. The Hon Deputy Governor will work with the Health team to ascertain what resources are available to facilitate this process for small groups;
- 9) noted the indication of the Health team that visitor arrivals could be accommodated before May 28, in line with the industry's needs. The Health team did not recommend introducing the protocols which are intended for July 1 any earlier, because of the need to increase vaccination numbers both in Anguilla and other countries, and manage the cluster. The date for implementation of the July 1 protocols is reviewed on a weekly basis by Council;
- 10) noted that further consideration would have to be given to the proposal of bringing forward the date for the requirement for visitors to be fully vaccinated. Whilst vaccination reduces the risk of transmission, it does not remove the risk entirely and transmission is still a possibility, so vaccination rates in Anguilla have to be considered;
- 11) noted that the definition of fully vaccinated will remain as 21 days after the second dose, as this is the recommendation for the Astra/Zeneca vaccine. It may be 14 days for other vaccines but for consistency 21 days after the second dose will be used:
- 12) noted and approved the de-escalation measures and the Exit Plan as per the table attached;
- 13)approved the extension of the following, for a 1-week period from May 7 to May 13:
 - a) Public Health (Temporary Restrictions on Movement of People and Public Gatherings) Regulations 2021, subject to amendment, to include the places listed in the de-escalation of measure essential services list, with hours of operation 6am - 4pm; and

- b) Public Health (Regulation of Ports) Regulations, subject to amendment, to allow the return of residents who left Anguilla for medical/health treatment;
- 14) reviewed the existing COVID-19 related Regulations which expire on May 6 and approved the extension of the following from 7 May 2021 until 20 May 2021:
 - a) Public Health (COVID-19 Monitoring of Approved Businesses) Regulations;
 - b) Public Health (Quarantine) (COVID-19) Regulations;
 - c) Emergency Powers (COVID-19 Border Control) Regulations and Proclamation; and
 - d) Quarantine (COVID-19) (Arriving Passengers Health Clearance); and
- 15) agreed that a joint statement by the Hon Premier and H.E. the Governor shall be issued today confirming the details of the way forward.
